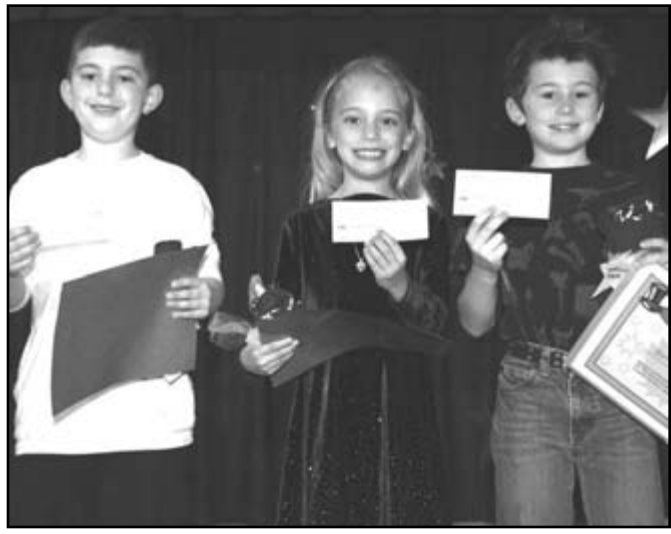




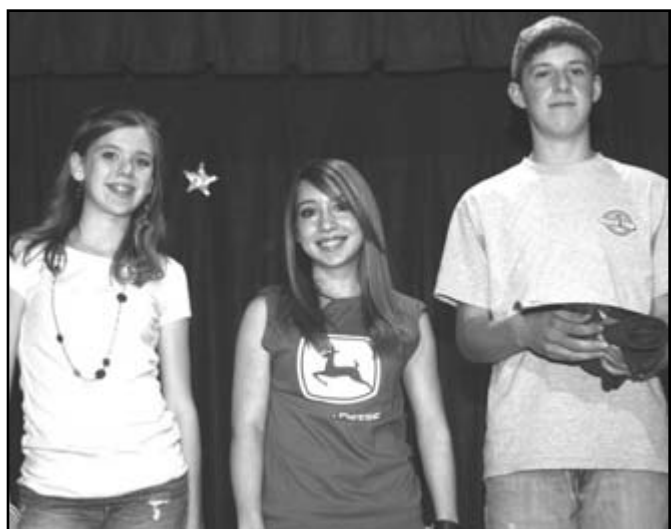

patrol trooper for almost three years in Bay City, then transferred to Fairfield in July 1983.

"We were on the coast and that wasn't our thing," the 52-year-old says. "Central Texas is what we wanted to move toward."

Rogillio's wife, Janet, is a native of Cameron. The two met at SHSU where she earned a bachelor of science degree in law enforcement/police science. Mrs. Rogillio has worked as investigator for the Freestone county attorney's office for more than 25 years.

The new assistant police chief reports that Bulger asked him some time back if he would be interested in the number two spot in the Fairfield department, and explains that when Flowers decided to retire he researched the job and applied.

The veteran law enforcement officer was formally hired by action of the city council last week.

commissioner Stanley Gregory.

According to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency exposure to sulfur dioxide emissions contributes to respiratory illness, particularly in children and the elderly, and aggravates existing heart and lung diseases.

Coal and petroleum contain sulfur compounds which generate sulfur dioxide during combustion. The primary source of sulfur dioxide emissions are coal-fired power plants.

In Texas there are 20 permitted coal mines listed through the Railroad Commission of Texas Surface Mining and Reclamation Division.

Luminant also plans to open a new lignite mine in Freestone county east of Lake Fairfield to continue providing fuel to Big

Brown.

Permits for a third power plant in Freestone county were recently filed with TCEQ.

The proposed natural gas-fired generating plant, operated by MyPower Corporation of Houston, will be located at FM 416 and CR196 near Richland-Chambers Reservoir.

The county's population of approximately 19,000 is 31,000 residents short of the 50,000 required to qualify for a federally funded air monitor.

TCEQ representatives estimated initial cost to the county at \$150,000 with \$35,000-65,000 a year for maintenance.

The estimate does not include a \$5,000 license to file data with TCEQ system which would also require \$1,000 maintenance.

Commissioners approved purchase of an air quality monitor but have yet to take action.

All proceeds from the game and banquet go to the Heart of Texas chapter of FCA.

Participants report for practices on June 10 and also will complete community service and put on a junior football and cheerleading camp.

The football players and cheerleaders also are to be honored at the FCA Victory Banquet on April 5 at the Ferrell Center of Baylor University.

Abstinence to be discussed

Programs stressing abstinence from sexual activity by teenagers is scheduled this month in Fairfield for students and their parents.

Aim for Success, Inc., of Dallas will present motivational programs in three settings at the Fairfield high school auditorium.

Parents may attend from 6-7 p.m. Tuesday, Feb. 17, and the next day girls will be presented the program at 9 a.m. and boys will attend at 10:30 a.m.

The student programs address the problems of teen pregnancies, escalating sexually transmitted disease epidemic and emotional pain often associated with teen sexual activity.

The parent program is a preview of the student presentation where parents learn creative ways to talk about sex with their children and encourage them to avoid sexual activity until marriage.

"This is a must see event for anyone concerned about the problems associated with teen sexual activity," Marilyn Morris, Aim for Success president, says. The motivation pro-

grams have been presented the past 15 years to more than a million young people across the United States on topics such as sex, drugs and alcohol.

FHS hosting academics

Fairfield high school hosts area teams Saturday for academic competition in preparation for the University Interscholastic League District 20-AAA meet next month.

FHS also is hosting the district meet.

Students have participated in a series of academic practice meets this semester to prepare for district, which Fairfield has won 18 of the past 19 years.

The district meet is divided into three parts, of which FHS hosts two—journalism, ready writing and speaking on March 25, and primarily mathematics and science on March 27.
